## Group Projects

A group project will be done by everyone in the class, and will count 30% of the course grade. The size of the groups will depend on the number of people in the class. The purpose of the project is to apply the concepts and techniques learned in this class to more realistic problems than any that could be found in a textbook. Thus the project is an important part of the course.

The topic of your project will be up to the group. Ideally, the topic should deal with some problem encountered by one or more of the group members in their other life. The analysis and solution of the problem should make use of the techniques of operations research that you have learned in your program, and it should apply to a military decision problem.

Project grade will be based on a written report of about 10 pages, and a short oral presentation during the last class period. The length of the oral presentation will be based on the number of groups. The grading criteria will be the following:

I will try to be flexible, particularly for groups that try extremely new or innovative projects. A project proposal is due on 16 October 2017 that explains the topic, identifies the group members, and discusses the anticipated approach ( $\leq 1$  page).
